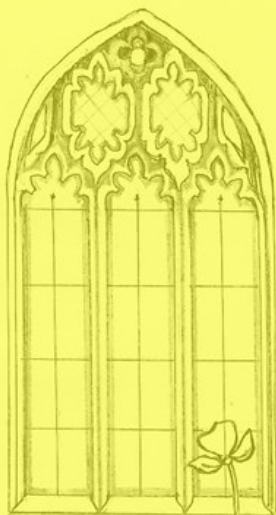


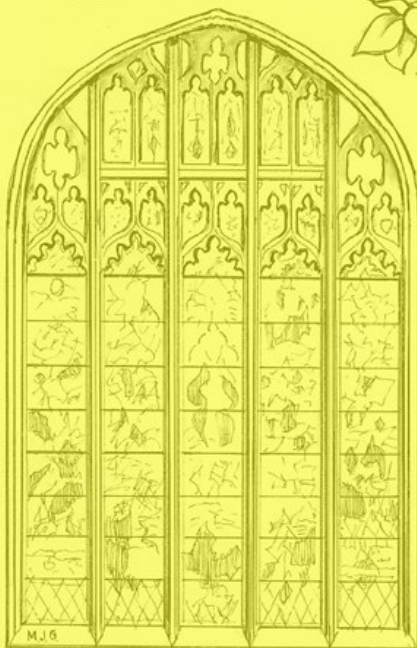

PASTORAL LETTER FROM OUR VICAR

I have always had a great fondness for history, so the proliferation of history podcasts over the last few years has been great. Recently I was listening to a really interesting one about the Sumer civilization who lived in what was Mesopotamia and is now modern-day southern Iraq. They were a truly ancient people who flourished between c.3500 BCE and 2000 BCE. The more I heard about the Sumerians, the more impressed I became. They were an absolutely remarkable civilisation and I can recommend looking them up.

They are credited with making some of the key foundations in human development. Their many achievements include developing cuneiform, one the first, if not the first known system of writing (*Although I found it a bit of a let-down to learn that writing was originally developed in order to keep track of tax records and agriculture trade*).

It is thanks largely to the thousands of little clay tablets, full of cuneiform writing, that we know about the Sumerians in such detail. They made foundational advances in engineering and agriculture. They worked out how to construct sophisticated canal and irrigation systems. It was so well organised that they could produce large crop surpluses. This allowed people, for the first time in history, to live together in dense, urban centres. There had been cities before but nothing like the complex and organised urbanisation of the Sumerians. They are often credited with inventing the “modern” city. At its peak, their civilization was based on a network of independent city-states, probably the most well-known are Uruk and Ur. Ur was a spectacular city!

Whilst the Sumerians may not have actually invented the wheel, they are credited with the landmark invention of the Potter’s Wheel and

then, by rotating the concept of the wheel by 90 degrees, the development of 4-wheeled battle wagons and the first 2-wheeled chariots.

By any standards they were remarkable, resourceful and inventive people. So it came as a shock to learn that climate change had played a crucial role in their decline and collapse.

To start with, their wonderful irrigation system that had been so vital to their growth and prosperity, had also lead to the inadvertent salinization of their soil, when dissolved mineral salts rose up into the topsoil and ruined it for crop production. It became harder and harder for them to feed their large population. As if this wasn't bad enough, they then suffered a mega-drought! It is known scientifically as the "4.2-Kiloyear" event. Changes in ocean currents and atmospheric patterns triggered a severe 200 to 300 year drought across large parts of the Near East. There was widespread famine and 75% of towns and cities were abandoned as people desperately sought better living conditions.

While this dramatic climate change is not *solely* to blame for the collapse of the Sumer Civilisation, it most certainly did produce a domino-effect that clearly shows how significant environmental-change can act as a catalyst for bringing existing political and economic problems to their breaking point. It is sobering to note that the 4.2 Kiloyear event did not only lead to the collapse of the Sumerians in Mesopotamia; in Egypt the "Old Kingdom" collapsed and 4.2 Kiloyear's catastrophic effects were even felt as far as the Indus Valley.

Before anyone tries to dismiss the significance of all this as a mildly interesting bit of ancient history, we must take note that it happened again 1000 years later with what is called the "3.2-kiloyear" event. This is often called the Late Bronze Age Collapse. This time the region's most famously decimated were Greece, Turkey, Levant and Egypt (the New Kingdom). Among its victims are famous names like the Mycenaean Greeks, the Hittites and Troy. An interesting point for readers of the Bible is that it is thought that the mysterious "Sea Peoples" mentioned in Biblical texts were part of the mass migrations caused by the widespread droughts and crop failures in the region. The most well-known of these Sea Peoples who settled in the land

became known as the Phillistines.

It should be very obvious why all this distant history made such an impact on me. It doesn't matter how sophisticated and creative a civilisation might become, in the past or our present, we become powerless in the face of drastic changes in weather patterns. The strain that "climate crisis" puts on our ability to have enough water to produce sufficient food *inevitably* acts as a catalyst on any pre-existing political and economic problems in our society. If we put our heads in the sand and pretend nothing needs to change, then we would be as foolish as those who peddle simple, quick fix solutions to such a monumental challenge.

We don't know what the future holds, but one thing is absolutely certain. Our Grandchildren and great-grandchildren, at the end of this 21st Century, will be living in a very different world. We might just about be still in time to have some influence on how some of those changes work out, although it is quite likely that it is already too late. Whatever happens, no-one can say that history didn't contain enough warnings. We think we are so much cleverer than the people of the past. That is a highly questionable opinion. In 1905 the Spanish writer and philosopher George Santayana famously wrote "*Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it*"

Genesis 2:15 *The Lord God placed the man in the Garden of Eden to tend and watch over it.*

PILGRIMS WITH PICNICS (DEVON)



Saint Mary the Virgin, Lynton. There can be few more stunning views from a church yard in Britain, looking down on Lynmouth and over the Bristol Channel. Tower is 13th C but most of what we see is around 1900. The interior is stunning with beautiful glass and altars. The pulpit is superb and very "Arts and Crafts".

Just so much history here, back to the bronze and iron ages, and for obvious reasons as a strategic and defensible spot (numerous hill forts).



The Battle of Cynwit was fought here (hill fort on Countisbury Hill). Forgotten now but monumental in its day when Oddo a discounted Saxon chieftain was confronted by a rampant Ubba, a wildly successful Viking overlord. The Vikings outnumbered the Saxons and arrogantly prepared to annihilate the beleaguered Saxons but Oddo didn't give them chance to prepare for siege and attack: he threw the Saxon defenders into an attack which seemed so unlikely and he totally crushed the Viking invaders. In so doing he started to turn the tide of the wider battle. England was piecemeal being overrun by Viking forces and King Alfred had fallen back to a "last redoubt" in the Somerset levels. Ubba was to press him from the North West until Oddo took the offensive and suddenly, the Vikings were not so ineluctable.



Lynton later became a great centre for tourism as the railway reached the town via a branch line from Barnstaple. The Romantic Poets fell in love with the magnificent terrain and Lynton became exotic. The church epitomises the very best in the “arts and crafts” movement: look at that pulpit and the glorious altar. That metal work was centred just down the road in Barnstaple at the production lines of Shapland and Petter.

1952 saw the truly dreadful disaster of Lynton and Lynmouth (the latter is at the foot of the monstrous North Devon cliffs). A “biblical” downpour, very localised, fell into the bogs of northern Exmoor, filled the headwaters of the River Lyn and the deluge swept down to the sea taking buildings and lives in its path.

Unlike the battle this will not be forgotten.

Lynton and Lynmouth are truly wonderful places to visit. The Valley of Rocks is in the lee of England’s most towering cliffs peopled by wild goats which have roamed as a herd since the Bronze Age. We have had so many picnics here.....

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PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The year always seems to go faster in the summer, warmer, months - it seems to me. It's the time of growing, blossoming, being outside more - with the added opportunity of seeing more friends, old and new, whilst out and about enjoying and seeing what changes nature has brought this year. Maybe a visit somewhere you enjoy? A cafe, the sea, the moor, a garden centre? Life seems more enjoyable in the nicer weather.

It needs to be noted that the nicer weather can get very hot and, as one resident told me last month, having been very active and outside living all their life, that you don't notice that as you get older the heat really can affect you and you can get dehydrated and exhausted more easily - so please do take extra care of your selves and your friends and neighbours during times of intense heat.

If you have been down to the park in recently you will have noticed the new patio outside the pavilion. KKPC again apologises for the inconvenience and disruption to the 2 disabled parking spaces being blocked whilst this work was going on, and hopes that the replaced broken slabs in front of the pavilion, the wider path at the playpark side of the pavilion and the extended apron of the patio will be worth it. The objective of this work is not just to repair the broken slabs that were difficult to walk on or push a push chair, wheelchair, rollator, walking frame or drive a mobility scooter on; it was about this and making the area more user friendly year round. The work has been carefully done in conjunction with the 3 sports clubs that use the playing fields so as not to be a problem for their matches and practices. It is hoped that the patio will be able to be used and enjoyed year round, along with a drink from the cafe or vending machines -

and that the heavy picnic tables will last for many years to come, now that they won't be sitting in wet ground for a good proportion of the year. The turn around the path at the side of the pavilion has been hazardous for mobility scooters for many years and now it is hoped that those getting about via a mobility scooter will be able to access and enjoy the park in a much safer manner, especially in the muddy months. No more mobility scooters stuck in the mud. As a reminder, the Diamond Jubilee gardens have matting under the grass in the centre, with the objective of providing a firm base for wheelchairs and mobility scooters. The funds for this project came from 3 sources, from the Pavilion Club CIC, from CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy on new homes) and from the Parish Council.

At the May Annual Parish Meeting Cllr John Radford was unanimously re-elected as Chair of KKPC and Cllr Jane Taylor was unanimously re-elected as Vice Chair. Jane and John are also our TDC Cllrs. I hope you will join KKPC in wishing John a thorough and speedy recovery from his recent surgery.

One of the many projects that our Chair, Cllr John Radford, has enthusiastically led on is the Churchway Lane Field and Allotments. The Allotments came into fruition last year with great success and this 2nd year is so successful that, despite all the serious rabbit proof fencing, the wildlife has managed to burrow in under the container that provides secure lockers for allotmenters and have been feasting on the tender young shoots.... Also a squirrel cheekily popped out from under the protective netting on one allotment.... Teething troubles and more for all of us involved to learn - the Church allotments also had to fend off enthusiastic rabbits in the early days. Very upsetting for the new allotmenters who have lost their hard work in growing of a crop. Peter Rabbit looms large.

Part of the Churchway Lane Field project - which is for the greater part for Youth Activities - is making the area suitable for use for the Navigators and any other groups who want to use it - whilst complying with Health and Safety and with the needs of the wildlife. Navigators now have a storage container for their equipment for Forrest School type of activities - one of the "retired" Navigators completed the 10 Tors event this year - congratulations. KKPC wants to sincerely thank Co-Create Architects who chose the Navigators and Churchway Lane Field as their Annual Day of Giving

to a Community Project and spent the entire day on 29th May constructing a shelter attached to the storage container. Thanks also to Bradfords for donating the materials for this project for free. The building day itself was very much like a party or festival - and the weather was perfect for it. This project will hopefully be enjoyed by the Navigators and their families, allotmenters and users of the Community Garden that is in the process of being built next to the allotments - but separate from them. Alex, our Facilities Maintenance Manager, who did all the construction work for the allotments, has built a privacy fence and a shelter in the community garden, whilst Cllr John Radford has planted some beautiful climbers to begin the growing. The plan is to have wheelchair accessible growing areas and a centrepiece with pathways around. Our Clerk applied for and won a grant from the National Lottery for the cost of the ground works to create this area - £2,560.00. KKPC hopes that the Community Garden will be enjoyed by many people in the years to come. There are also plans for a community orchard - potentially for next year.

In other news, as of time of writing this, the Water Lane toilets are open again. Unfortunately KKPC has to keep closing them due to 1 person in the village who persists in vandalising them and creating the most disgusting and health hazard messes in them - which then have to be cleared and cleaned up by Alex. It is really unacceptable that anyone should be expected to have to do this un-necessary work caused by deliberate vandalism.

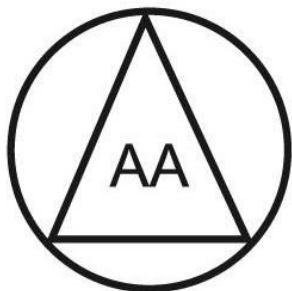

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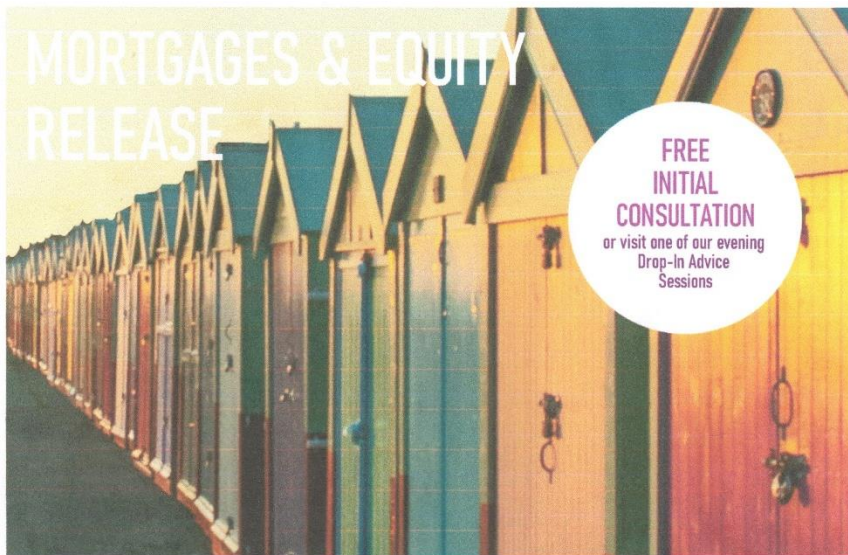
