Our Core Christian Values

Love and Friendship

Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Development

The **Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development** of pupils and adults in the school community forms part of the daily life of our school.

We have a **shared language** to express **spirituality**, which flourishes through the relationships we build with ourselves, others, Creation (beauty), and with God/transcendence (something 'bigger' than ourselves). These relationships can be understood in terms of a web of invisible threads that we are constantly adding to.

Collective Worship at Our School

Collective Worship is the heartbeat of our school. It is an important part in the daily life that provides a space for our school community to engage in conversation with God and personal reflections, as individuals and together.

Collective Worship is planned around the church seasons, our Christian values and celebrations, as well as other world events. Our Christian values are celebrated half-termly within a theme.



Our daily worship takes place towards the end of the day and provides opportunities for adults (teachers and clergy) and pupils to participate in some way.



Collective Worship

Sacred Spaces

Sacred spaces in class provides a platform for a display of our values and the current theme, and should encourage personal reflection, for example, through prayers and art. Our values are changed every half-term and the cloth colour reflects the liturgical (church) year and season.



Children Involvement

It is important that all children who would like to be involved are provided with opportunities to be involved! Children enjoy taking part and there are many areas, such as opening worship (as per slide below), role-play, reading prayers – older children are capable of planning and leading their own worship.



Prayers and Reflection

Prayer is always invitational and children will never be forced to close their eyes and pray. All at worship are invited to share their prayers, as well as to join in with others, and to say 'amen' at the end should they wish to make the prayer their own. They are reminded to be respectful by bowing their heads and to not distract others around them. Children and staff may wish to say spontaneous prayers, which is always welcomed.


